NEW ALBANY FIRE DEPARTMENT

Strengthening Fleet, Team, and Future with New Ladder Truck, Personnel Additions, and Union Agreement

The City of New Albany Fire Department continues to invest in the safety and well-being of residents with the addition of a new 100-foot platform ladder truck, the hiring of 11 firefighters, and the signing of a new three-year labor contract with the New Albany Professional Firefighters Union Local 410.

These combined efforts underscore the City's ongoing commitment to public safety, preparedness, and the hardworking men and women who protect our community every day.

A Modern Tool for a Safer City

In August 2025, the department officially placed its new platform ladder truck into service.

Unlike a traditional straight ladder, the new platform-style ladder allows firefighters to operate from a secure, enclosed platform rather than standing directly on the ladder or rooftop. This provides increased safety and stability during ventilation, overhaul, and observation tasks, even in hazardous conditions.

The truck's reach offers vital access to New Albany's taller structures, including apartment buildings, hotels, and commercial complexes, and enables firefighters to deliver elevated water streams, a critical capability for extinguishing large fires quickly and safely.

"This new truck gives our firefighters the flexibility and safety they need to manage complex incidents," said Chief Juliot. "It's not just an upgrade; it's an investment in the safety of our city and the people who serve it."



Welcoming 11 New Firefighters

This year, the department also welcomed 11 new firefighters, each completing their initial training and joining crews citywide. Please join us in welcoming: Adam McKnight, Terence Brown, Jacob Metcalf, Nathan Jones, Andrew Losson, Malik Peters, Adison Dorris, Jaden Grant, Kevin Hodges, Christopher Jimenez, and John Miller.

These new recruits represent the next generation of public safety professionals, bringing enthusiasm, skill, and dedication to the department's long-standing tradition of service.

City and Fire Union Agree to 3-Year Contract

It also expands training opportunities, ensuring that New Albany's firefighters remain equipped with the latest techniques and best practices in fire and emergency services.

While many cities across Indiana are facing public safety funding reductions caused by state legislation, New Albany continues to prioritize its first responders, offering well-earned raises and maintaining strong public safety investments through careful and prudent financial management.

This agreement stands as a testament to the City's ongoing commitment to public safety and its partnership with the men and women of the New Albany Fire Department.

HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE

Helping First-Time Buyers Achieve the Dream of Homeownership

The City of New Albany's Homeowner Assistance Program continues to make a meaningful impact, helping local residents take the final step toward achieving the dream of homeownership. Since the program began, seven individuals/families have purchased their first homes through the initiative, including individuals with disabilities, veterans, and young couples starting families.



Among the success stories is Alexis "Lexi," who recently purchased her own home in New Albany with the help of a City down payment grant.

"As a first-time homebuyer, I was doing a lot of research on ways to make the process more affordable," Lexi shared. "A family member actually sent me a Facebook post from the City of New Albany about the program, and it immediately caught my attention. The chance to receive a grant for my down payment felt like the extra boost I needed to make homeownership a reality."

Lexi learned about the Homeowner Assistance Program online and decided to apply. The process, she said, was simple and supportive, especially for someone navigating home buying for the first time and without a realtor.

"I had a great experience working with both the City of New Albany and the Wheatley Group. Everyone I interacted with was helpful and responsive. There were a few steps, such as submitting documentation and completing a homebuyer education course, but nothing felt too overwhelming. I would absolutely recommend the program to others who are eligible!"

Through the grant, Lexi was able to purchase a home for herself and her dog, complete with a backyard and space to start her own garden.

"I've worked extremely hard to get to this point, and receiving the grant felt like a huge validation of that effort," Lexi said. "It not only helped with the down payment, but also gave me a little financial breathing room to take care of some important repairs and updates. I'm incredibly grateful for that support."

The City of New Albany launched the Homeowner Assistance Program to remove financial barriers and make homeownership more attainable for local residents. The program provides down payment assistance grants to qualified applicants, helping them secure stable, long-term housing and invest in their community.

According to Grant Manager Keeton Gibson, the program's success stories demonstrate its wide-reaching impact:

- Three of the new homeowners are female heads of household.
- Three participants are individuals with disabilities.
- One young couple, ages 22 and 19, purchased their first home together.
- Another couple was able to buy the home they had rented for over a decade.
- One family purchased a home just in time to welcome a new baby.
- And one 73-year-old veteran bought his very first home.

"Programs like this one are about more than financial assistance; they're about giving people a real opportunity to plant roots in our community," said Gibson. "Each homeowner represents a story of determination, resilience, and hope."

MONON TRAIL UPDATE

City Unlocks Key Component to Future Monon South Freedom Trail

At New Albany's Redevelopment Commission meeting, the board voted unanimously to pursue the acquisition of the New Albany Golf Course property, located at 1706 Graybrook Lane.

This strategic move marks a major milestone in the development of the Monon South Freedom Trail, a transformational project that will ultimately span nearly 63 miles from New Albany to Mitchell, Indiana. Phase 1 of the trail, now under construction, ends just outside the golf course property, making this location a critical connection point for future expansion. Phase 2 will extend the trail north toward the Clark-Floyd County line.

In recent years, several developers have expressed interest in the golf course property for large-scale, multi-family residential projects. By moving to acquire the property, the City of New Albany is taking proactive steps to preserve this important community asset while unlocking new opportunities to expand and enhance the Monon South Freedom Trail for generations to come.

DNR AND CITY REACH DAM SETTLEMENT:

Joint Settlement States Mayor's Actions Were Taken With Intent to Protect Public Safety

Mayor Jeff Gahan and the Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) have reached a comprehensive agreement resolving all outstanding legal matters surrounding the Glenwood Park Dam and establishing a collaborative path forward to improve safe access to Silver Creek.

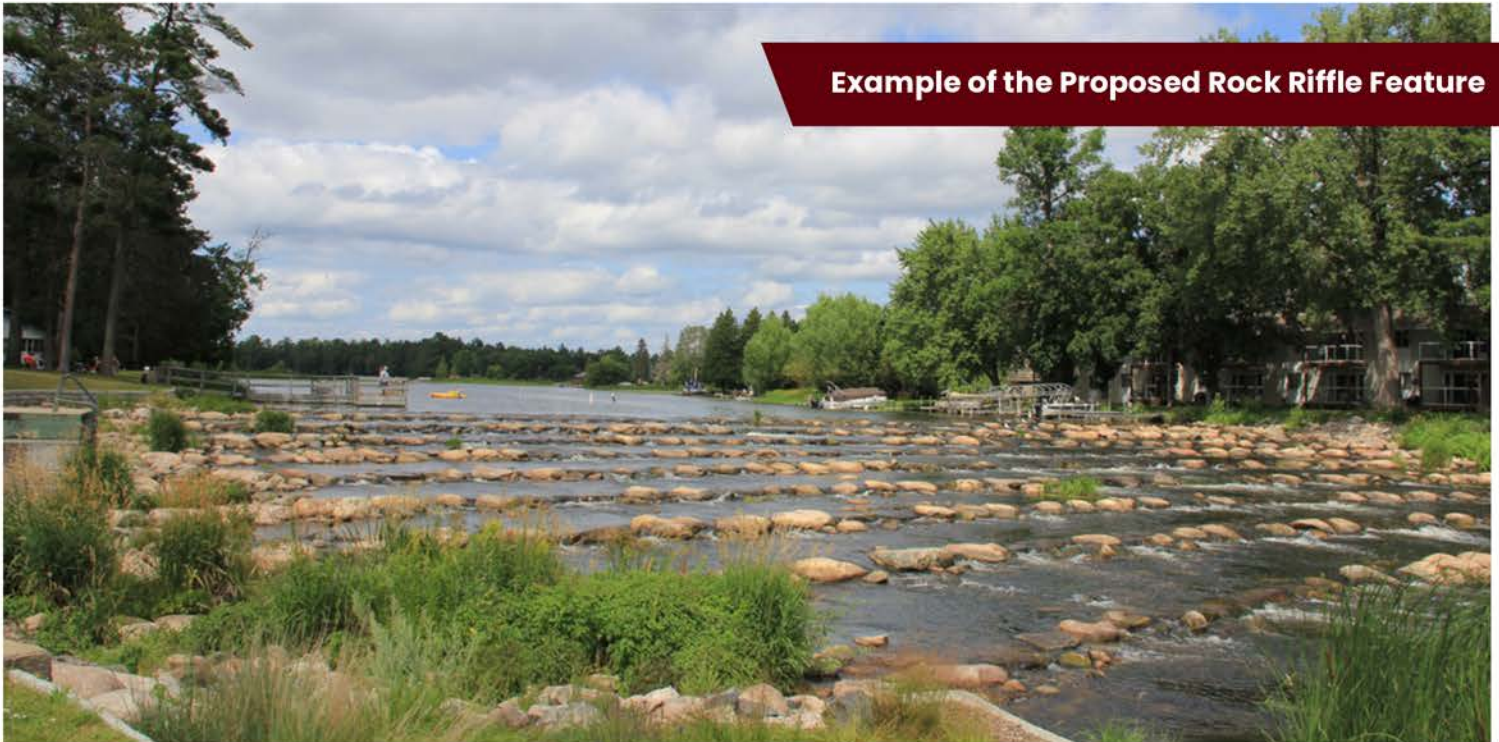


"I knew from the start that we were doing the right thing to protect public safety by initiating our emergency maintenance at the historic Glenwood Park Dam, and this agreement proves it," stated Mayor Jeff Gahan. "Now that this matter is behind us, we can focus on our new addition to Silver Creek that will improve recreation, fishing, and the ecosystem for decades to come. As this project comes to life, I can't wait to share more with the public — you're going to love it!"

In December of 2022, the New Albany City Council unanimously passed a resolution (9-0) asking for all parties to meet and have discussions before removal of the historic dam. The City of New Albany has tried multiple times to initiate discussions with Origin Park and River Heritage Officials to discuss these important issues, but they have declined, including repeated recent requests to do so this year.

The agreement follows last year's tragic drowning of a young man who became trapped in a dangerous hydraulic roller in Silver Creek, a recirculating current often formed near low-head dams. In response, Mayor Gahan ordered emergency maintenance to restore the dam to its original condition by adding shot rock to eliminate the hazardous hydraulic rollers. The action was successful and removed the immediate safety risk to swimmers and recreational users.

"We have been trying for years to improve our natural waterways, and with this agreement, I can happily report that we have achieved that," Mayor Gahan said. "I want to thank our City Council members for their continued support for our natural resources and assets."

Conditions at Silver Creek Landing and the historic Glenwood Park Dam have changed drastically since the collapse of the Blackiston Mill Dam upstream. The failure of that dam has severely reduced the summer pool to a trickle. Now that only the Glenwood Park Dam exists, the City has been pursuing an alternative feature to support fish, wildlife, and recreation in Silver Creek, as well as support the nearly \$4.5 million in infrastructure and additions at the Landing, neighborhood trails, and connections to the Ohio River Greenway.

This week, the City of New Albany and DNR finalized a global settlement regarding the Glenwood Park Dam. Here are the details:

- DNR and City settlement states Mayor Gahan’s actions were taken with the intent to protect public safety.
- The City will allow ECI, when water conditions are safe to enter, to remove the Glenwood Park Dam.
- The City will temporarily relocate materials from the emergency maintenance project for use in a future water feature.
- The City will be filing a permit for a rock riffle structure like others approved throughout the State.
- The City and DNR will work together in good faith through the permitting process on the rock riffle feature for Silver Creek enhancements.

These modern features significantly increase waterway safety while creating an attractive, naturalized environment suitable for swimming, wading, kayaking, and fishing.

Additional design work and public updates will be shared as the rock-riffle project moves into its next phase.

The New Albany Farmers Market is thriving like never before, with recent upgrades and an exciting lineup of new vendors. Market Street, the market is open every Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon during the winter season, and from 8 a.m. to noon in the spring and summer, with a bonus Christmas Market in December.

Visitors can shop an incredible variety of locally sourced products, enjoy live entertainment, take part in wellness activities, and attend special kids' events, making the market a true community destination.

PROSSER EXPANSION

Phase 1 of the Prosser Expansion Project is complete

Prosser has officially finished phase 1 of their expansion, beginning with Prosser's programming to include Plumbing and Education Professions. Developed in partnership with Indiana University Southeast, Ivy Tech Community College, and Prosser. Students now have access to a new Plumbing classroom and lab, as well as a combined manufacturing lab that integrates Design Technology with Automation and Robotics.

In addition, Prosser's former auditorium has been completely renovated into a modern Community Room, proudly sponsored by META. Construction is also underway on a 12,000-square-foot storage facility that will serve both Prosser and NAFCS, providing shared space for equipment storage and rotation of items for sale.



Phase 1 was completed in early November. With this expansion, Prosser continues to deliver industry-leading labs, technology, and training while increasing student capacity by 60 to 80 seats. These improvements not only enhance learning but also strengthen the region's workforce by adding programs that align with local industry needs.

Looking ahead, Prosser is already planning for future growth, including the addition of an Aviation Maintenance program next year. The entire Phase 1 project has been funded through the school's cash balance, ensuring smart investment in the future of education and career readiness across Southern Indiana.

WINTER STORMWATER TIPS

Protecting Our Waterways All Season Long

As temperatures drop and winter weather moves in, it's important to remember that how we manage snow and ice can have a big impact on our local stormwater system and waterways. The City of New Albany encourages residents to take a few simple steps this season to help prevent pollution, flooding, and damage to infrastructure.

- **Shovel First, Salt Second**
 - Before reaching for salt or de-icer, shovel and clear as much snow as possible. This reduces the amount of salt needed, and less salt means less runoff into storm drains and streams.
- **Use Salt Sparingly**
 - When ice is unavoidable, use de-icer products only where necessary. A little goes a long way! Choose products containing calcium magnesium acetate (CMA) or potassium chloride, which are less harmful to plants, pets, and waterways.
- **Keep Storm Drains Clear**
 - As snow and ice melt, make sure nearby storm drains are free of leaves, trash, or debris. Blocked drains can cause localized flooding and push pollutants into the drainage system.
- **Avoid Dumping Snow in Streams or Drains**
 - Snow pushed directly into storm drains or waterways carry salt, litter, and debris straight into our local rivers. Pile snow in grassy areas where it can melt and filter naturally.
- **Winter Ready at Home**
 - Inspect gutters and downspouts to ensure they're clear before freezing temperatures arrive. Proper drainage helps prevent ice buildup and roof damage.



By taking these small steps, residents can make a big difference in keeping New Albany's stormwater system flowing smoothly and protecting the health of our local waterways all winter long.

Together, we can keep New Albany clean, green, and water-wise, no matter the season.

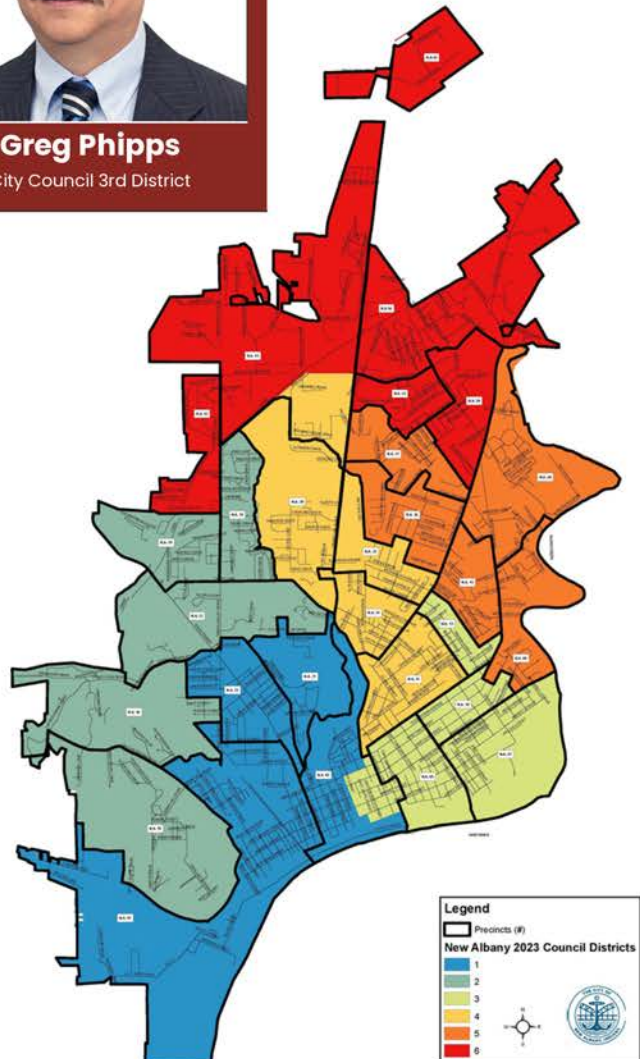
